Join the ranks of the Residents Academy. This once-a-month class will be held in the Smith Performing Arts Center within the Osborne Community Plaza by Ptl. Ross Shirey, Community Involvement Officer, from the Willoughby Police Department.

For June's Residents Academy, Detective Jonathan Mehm will present a case study involving a sophisticated imposter scam that resulted in an elderly victim losing approximately \$93,980:

The victim was manipulated by suspects posing as financial representatives and was directed to make multiple cash withdrawals and cash handoffs under the belief that the funds would eventually be refunded.

The case study will examine the investigative steps used to identify a suspect, including the collection of financial records, surveillance footage, cellular records, and a forensic examination of a seized cellular phone.

This case study will highlight common fraud tactics targeting vulnerable victims and demonstrate how digital evidence and interagency cooperation can be used to successfully investigate and corroborate complex financial crimes.

Resident Association Bylaw Changes

There are three proposed Bylaws changes which the residents need to vote on at their next Resident Meeting. Attached is a copy of the Resident Assoc. Bylaws with proposed amendments highlighted in yellow.

Resident Assoc. Bylaw Changes

The first amendment is on page 7 of the Bylaws: currently the President and Secretary are elected in the even years and the Vice President in the odd year. Timing of Elections. **The President and Vice President will be elected in the even years and the Secretary in the odd years.** Rationale: Makes it possible for succession of the Vice President to President possible without having a one-year delay for that to happen.

The second amendment is on pages 4 and 5, Qualifications of Division Officers. **The wording that would be added is: a residency of one year at OLBV in the division when the term of office begins.** Rationale: currently there is no length of residency requirement for division representatives.

The third amendment is on page 5, Division Committees. **This is simply adding mention of culinary to the suggested committee structure.** Rationale: we normally think of 3 primary, every-day services – maintenance, culinary, and activities. The Bylaws are intentionally not detailed in how the independent living divisions operate. Each division is unique and has the flexibility to develop its own structure and processes. Discussion of division committees was added to the Bylaws in the last revision to clarify that routine concerns should be handled at the division level rather than being brought directly to the Forum meeting. This amendment is not essential but may be a helpful addition. The process for amending the Bylaws is on page 9.

We need votes from each division meeting for each of the 3 proposed amendments:

Vote #1 – Approve the wording of the Timing of Elections.

Vote #2 – Approve the intent and wording of the Qualifications of Division Officers changes.

Vote #3 – Approve the intent and wording of the Division Committees change.

The Forum has voted on these changes and now the proposed changes need to be posted for 30 days before the divisions vote on them at their meetings after the 30-day period.

Since, two of the divisions meet before the 30-day notice, the Divisions will need to vote on these at their August meetings and a final vote taken at the September Forum meeting.

PRIDE MONTH

June is recognized as Pride Month and is dedicated to the celebration of the LGBTQ (Lesbian, Gay, Bi-sexual, Transsexual, Queer) pride and recognizes this culture and community. The date coincides with the anniversary of the 1969 Stonewall riots which took place in New York City. The riots started in a Greenwich Village Inn on June 28, 1969, as a protest against police raids on establishments which served mostly Gay men.

President Bill Clinton in 1999 said June would be "Gay and Lesbian Pride Month". In 2011, President Barack Obama expanded the recognition to include the whole LGBTQ community. President Biden continued this recognition. The Pride Month observation has grown to a global celebration of LGBTQ culture and identity.

Cleveland Pride Day is June 6th. Geauga County's Pride Celebration is June 20th at Chardon Square and Lake County will celebrate on August 15th at the Lake County Historical Center in Painesville.

Weekly Scripture Verse and Devotional from Chaplain Bev...

Confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The earnest prayer of a righteous person has great power and produces wonderful results. (James 5:16)

Imagine a sick person who doesn't tell anyone about their symptoms. Without help, getting through their illness would be challenging. Similarly, when we don't tell anyone about the challenges we're facing, it can be harder to work through them. Sometimes we do things we know are wrong, but we don't tell anyone because we're ashamed, embarrassed or think we can handle it on our own. It's hard to share our mistakes with others, but when we keep them to ourselves, we're like the sick person who won't ask for help. This passage tells us to confess our sins. Confession frees us from isolation and provides a way to heal. And when we pray for one another, we give God the opportunity to work in our hearts. As we share our brokenness with God, He invites us on a journey that will help us grow closer to Him.
